About Semcac



Semcac was established as a private, non-profit organization in 1966. Originally known as the Southeast Minnesota Citizens Action Council, Inc., the agency's legal name has been Semcac since 1995. Beginning in Winona, Fillmore and Houston counties, Semcac is now the designated Community Action Agency for seven counties—Dodge, Fillmore, Freeborn, Houston, Mower, Steele and Winona—and provides services in five additional counties—Goodhue, Olmsted, Rice, Wabasha and Waseca.

Semcac offers over 25 programs from 70 locations which include the main office in Rushford, a Semcac Center in Winona, 7 county offices (Contact Centers), 9 Head Start centers, Transportation Dispatch Center in Kasson and 44 Senior Dining sites and/or kitchens. We currently have a workforce of approximately 236 people.

Semcac has been connecting people with resources to ensure that they can achieve their goals of self-reliance and independence for 51 years. We are the voice for the voiceless and invest private, federal and public dollars back into the communities to strengthen our greatest resource- the people.



Impact in Houston County - Helping Greater Minnesota's Rural Communities

Senior Nutrition results in seniors who are empowered to maintain their health and nutritional wellbeing and allows at-risk seniors to remain in their own home.

- 14,062 hot, nutritious meals were served in a congregate setting at Senior Dining to 453 seniors in Houston County.
- 8,285 nutritious meals were delivered by Meals on Wheels volunteers to 87 Houston County seniors in Eitzen, Hokah, Houston, La Crescent and Spring Grove.

Senior and Caregiver Advocacy results in seniors maintaining safe and independent living.

- 55 seniors and/or caregivers in Houston County received individual assistance to identify needs, access resources, make informed decisions and reduce feelings of isolation.

Energy Assistance results in keeping people warm by heating homes during the winter season, thus extending the limited, low household income.

- 466 households in Houston County received assistance with their utility payments during the winter season. And, 80 households received additional crisis assistance.

Weatherization results in greener communities, lower energy bills for low-income people and creates new jobs.

- 36 households in Houston County had their homes weatherized and learned more about energy conservation. 8 households received home conservation services funded through the local utility companies' Conservation Improvement Programs administered by Semcac.
- 8 households received energy related repairs, such as furnace replacement.

Housing Rehab Loans result in improved living condition for low-income people and the preservation of quality affordable housing.

- 2 households were assisted via the Minnesota Housing Rehab Loan Program, in Houston County, administered by Semcac.

Head Start & Early Head Start result in empowered families and young children who are ready for kindergarten. Head Start families receive comprehensive services from Semcac.

- 50 children and their families (in 19 households) were educated at the Head Start Centers, in Houston County during the program year.
- 30 children (age birth – 3 years) and/or pregnant women received Early Head Start services, in Houston County

Outreach and Emergency Services supports people through a crisis and allows them to more effectively utilize their limited income until they reach stability.

- 332 households (862 people) accessed food for their families and extended their limited incomes by visiting the Houston County Food Shelf located in Caledonia. These households visited more than once; we provided food shelf assistance 2,032 times.
- 66 individuals from 41 households in Houston County attended budgeting or financial literacy education/counseling.
- 33 families received crisis financial assistance for transportation, a medical issue or another immediate basic need in Houston County.
- 455 individuals received donated articles in Houston County.
- 251 families, in Houston County, were provided with holiday/Christmas presents who could not afford gifts during the holiday season. The majority of the gifts were for children and seniors.
- 8 families were assisted with payments such as rent or mortgage, to prevent homelessness in Houston County.
- 50 households were assisted by Semcac staff to complete applications for assistance; sometimes the application for assistance is provided by a partner agency, such as the Salvation Army, etc.
- Staff provided information & referrals to other sources/organization for 224 individuals from 86 families in Houston County. Staff also provided information & referrals within the agency to 523 households in Houston County.

Family Planning – Semcac Clinic services result in an increased number of cancer screenings for women, the prevention & treatment of STI's, a reduced number of unplanned pregnancies, an increase in education about sexual health.

- 30 patients residing in Houston County were provided services at Semcac Clinic in Winona.
- Last year, the Clinic's Education & Outreach Specialist presented comprehensive, reproductive and sexual health education information at events, reaching 2,416 people.

Semcac Transportation results in people getting to their medical and dental appointments, senior dining and other locations to meet essential needs; assisting people with no other means of transportation.

- 12,497 rides were provided on Rolling Hills Transit buses in Houston County.
- 3,377 rides were provided to 174 people through the Volunteer Driver Program in Houston County.

Semcac Overall - FY2017 Statistics

- Semcac served 21,016 unduplicated individuals in addition to providing 58,354 rides via public transit, Rolling Hills Transit bussing.
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- Semcac has 1,176 partnerships with 965 organizations, as of fiscal year 2017.
- Semcac serves 7 southeastern MN counties and provides limited services in 5 additional counties.
