About Semcac



Semcac was established as a private, non-profit organization in 1966. Originally known as the Southeast Minnesota Citizens Action Council, Inc., the agency's legal name has been Semcac since 1995. Beginning in Winona, Fillmore and Houston counties, Semcac is now the designated Community Action Agency for seven counties—Dodge, Fillmore, Freeborn, Houston, Mower, Steele and Winona—and provides services in five additional counties—Goodhue, Olmsted, Rice, Wabasha and Waseca.

Semcac offers over 25 programs from 70 locations which include the main office in Rushford, a Semcac Center in Winona, 7 county offices (Contact Centers), 9 Head Start centers, Transportation Dispatch Center in Kasson and 44 Senior Dining sites and/or kitchens. We currently have a workforce of approximately 236 people.

Semcac has been connecting people with resources to ensure that they can achieve their goals of self-reliance and independence for 51 years. We are the voice for the voiceless and invest private, federal and public dollars back into the communities to strengthen our greatest resource- the people.



Impact in Mower County - Helping Greater Minnesota's Rural Communities

Senior Nutrition results in seniors who are empowered to maintain their health and nutritional wellbeing and allows at-risk seniors to remain in their own home.

- 7,862 hot, nutritious meals were served in a congregate setting at Senior Dining to 110 seniors in Mower County.
- 2,321 nutritious meals were delivered by Meals on Wheels volunteers to 22 Mower County seniors in Adams, Dexter, Grand Meadow and Rose Creek.

Energy Assistance results in keeping people warm by heating homes during the winter season, thus extending the limited, low household income.

- 1,173 households in Mower County received assistance with their utility payments during the winter season. And, 164 households received additional crisis assistance.

Weatherization results in greener communities, lower energy bills for low-income people and creates new jobs.

- 9 households in Mower County had their homes weatherized and learned more about energy conservation. 5 households received home conservation services funded through the local utility companies' Conservation Improvement Programs administered by Semcac.
- 37 households received emergency energy related repairs, such as furnace replacement.

Housing Rehab Loans result in improved living condition for low-income people and the preservation of quality affordable housing.

- 6 homes in Mower County were assisted with Small Cities Development Program projects, in LeRoy.
- 3 households in Mower County was assisted with rehabilitation through the Minnesota Housing Fix-Up Fund program, administered by Semcac.

Head Start & Early Head Start result in empowered families and young children who are ready for kindergarten. Head Start families receive comprehensive services from Semcac.

- 223 children and their families (in 85 households) were educated by Head Start professionals in Mower County, during the program year.
 - 82 children (age birth – 3 years) and/or pregnant women received Early Head Start services, at their home, in Mower County.

Outreach and Emergency Services supports people through a crisis and allows them to more effectively utilize their limited income until they reach stability.

- 135 individuals from 49 households in Mower County attended budgeting or financial literacy education/counseling.
- 49 households were assisted with payments such as rent or mortgage, to prevent homelessness in Mower County.
- 4 individuals received donated articles in Mower County.
- Staff provided information & referrals (to other/outside organizations) to 1,734 individuals from 667 households in Mower County. Staff also provided information & referrals within the agency to 3,795 households in Mower County.

Semcac Overall - FY2017 Statistics

- Semcac served 21,016 unduplicated individuals in addition to providing 58,354 rides via public transit, Rolling Hills Transit bussing.
- Semcac has 1,176 partnerships with 965 organizations, as of fiscal year 2017.
- Semcac serves 7 southeastern MN counties and provides limited services in 5 additional counties.
