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What is HPV?

HPV stands for Human Papillomavirus. It is an infection that causes warts on various parts of the body, depending on the strain. This is the virus that is responsible for the warts that can grow on your hands, feet, and gentials. Usually these warts are harmless and go away on their own, but sometimes an HPV infection can lead to cancer. HPV is the most common STI.

Should I Get Tested?

There is only an HPV test for the cervix, but not other gential areas like the penis, vulva, or anus. Because HPV is the most common STI and it often clears up on it's own, most people will never know they even have it. An HPV test is similar to a Pap test, where a small sample of cells is taken from the cervix and then sent to the lab for testing. Sometimes HPV tests are done at the same time as a Pap. Not everyone needs an HPV test though. Your healthcare provider might recommend one if you're older than 25, instead of a Pap; between the ages of 30-65, along with a Pap; or as a follow-up to an abnormal result from a Pap test.

The HPV Vaccine

August is National Immunization Awareness Month and HPV is the only STI and cancer causing virus that has a vaccine to help protect you from it! The HPV vaccine is a 2-3 series of injections given over a six month period that protects the body from the types of HPV that can cause most causes of gential warts and cancers of the cervix, anus, vulva, and vagina. The HPV vaccine can be given between the ages of 9-26 years old and everyone, regardless of gender, should receive it. The HPV vaccine is available at our clinic.
